



Amy Goodman S.E.A – the Sculptor

The Coastal Forces Monument is being created by award-winning sculptor Amy Goodman S.E.A., whose public works across the UK have become lasting landmarks of remembrance and pride. Her work is celebrated for its sense of movement, character, and emotion — qualities that bring her subjects vividly to life.

Amy discovered her love for sculpture as a teenager — particularly that of the horse, a lifelong passion. This early fascination developed into a career that combines artistic intuition with technical precision. Influenced by classical sculpture, she brings a contemporary edge to figurative and equestrian subjects, often leaving the imprint of her hands and tools visible in the final piece — fluid mark-making that gives vitality and texture to the surface.

Her major equestrian commissions include the Romsey War Horse & Trooper memorial, Pegasus and Bellerophon, and The Arborfield Horses. Most recently, her life-size bronze of Olympic event horse Blackfoot Mystery — a dynamic leaping Thoroughbred — was installed in Texas, USA, marking the international reach of her work.

Her portrait work includes Florence Nightingale at Gun Hill Park in Aldershot, Sir Stirling Moss for the British Racing Drivers' Club, The Glimmer Twins (Sir Mick Jagger and Keith Richards) in Dartford, as well as the Gurkha Memorial and Airborne Soldier in Aldershot.

Most recently, Amy has sculpted two bronze statues of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, depicting the late monarch at two stages of her life. One stands in Andover, while the second — portraying the young Queen at the time of her Coronation — will be unveiled in the grounds of Romsey Abbey next year.

The Coastal Forces Monument marks Amy's first major maritime commission. It continues her dedication to creating public artworks that honour courage, service, and community — sculptures that connect people to history and stand as enduring symbols of shared pride and remembrance.
